

## The Annual Report 2025

The Finnish Institute in the Middle East (FIME) is a research institute that focuses on studying Middle Eastern cultures, religions, societies, and classical and modern languages. The institute supports Finnish research on the Middle East and offers teaching in cooperation with universities. The institute also brings research-based perspectives to public discourse on the Middle East. The Finnish Institute in the Middle East operates in the whole region with an office in Beirut, Lebanon, and a representative in Cairo, Egypt. FIME is hosted by the Foundation of the Finnish Institute in the Middle East, based in Helsinki.

### Message from the chairperson

I have served as Chair of the Foundation's Board for two years, and it has been an honour to contribute to advancing FIME's important work and operations as a high-standard and multidisciplinary Finnish research institute.

Compared to the previous year, the institute's operating environment was calmer in 2025, and the Executive Committee made a visit to Beirut in October 2025. During the visit, groundwork was laid for FIME's strategy for 2026–2028, which was approved at the December Board meeting. At the same time, the Executive Committee had the opportunity to visit the vineyard of Finland's Honorary Consul, Zafer Chaoui, in Zahle. FIME's board would like to thank the Honorary Consul for his long-standing cooperation and support.

I would like to thank Susanne Dahlgren, who has led the institute with distinction for three years in Lebanon's volatile political and security situation. At the same time, I thank her for her excellent contribution to FIME. I wish Susanne success as she moves on to new challenges at the beginning of June. I would also like to thank Manal Chatila for managing the practical affairs of the Beirut office. Through her research of ancient Near East, Joanna Töyräänvuori has also brought depth to the understanding of the modern Middle East. Antti Tarvainen, in turn, shed light on issues related to the start-up sector in Israel and Palestine.

Last year also brought new faces to FIME's activities. Juha Mäkelä has been appointed as the new director and will take up his post on June 1, 2026. Sylvia Akar began as FIME's representative in Cairo in March. Osteoarchaeologist Nina Maaranen, who moved on to the University of Warsaw in June, and Assyriologist Joanna Töyräänvuori joined FIME as researchers.

The contribution of the Foundation's staff in Helsinki is also important. My warmest thanks go to Anu Leinonen and Laura Aho, who have not only ensured that FIME's legal obligations and practical matters are handled, but have also built and maintained relationships with key stakeholders. Safa Al-Khalidi has made a significant contribution as a representative of the Middle Eastern diaspora.

I would also like to thank the members of the Board for their active work for FIME and welcome Topias Tanskanen and Maruan El-Krekshi to the Board. I further thank Maria Serenius, Pekka Lindqvist, and Tom Kankkonen, who are stepping down from the Board, for their contributions to FIME.

## **Review by the director**

The year 2025 got off to a flying start at the institute: in January, two Badaro Talks lectures were held in quick succession, prompting some to ask, “What’s happening next week?”. During the year, we hosted numerous internationally renowned scholars, including some from the United States and the United Kingdom. We further strengthened our position as a provider of “the most interesting lectures” in the city, as one of our regular attendees described it. We also began livestreaming our events, enabling participation from Finland. Although it has only been in operation for two years, Badaro Talks has established itself as a discussion forum that easily attracts well-known speakers.

Although the situation in Lebanon remained “ordinarily unstable” (Lebanese term) following the 2024 ceasefire agreement, daily life and the running of the institute proceeded quite smoothly. In the spring, an internationally renowned osteoarchaeologist Nina Maaranen, served as a researcher at the institute. Later in the spring she went on to take up an associate professorship at the University of Warsaw. Nina also strengthened our ties with the Lebanese school system by visiting schools to present researchers’ work to pupils. During the summer Joanna Töyräänvuori took over Nina’s position.

We participated as a co-organiser in the conference of the Arab Council for Social Sciences, which is held every two years in Beirut. This American organisation carries out important work in promoting social science research in the Arab world. For FIME, this cooperation opened doors to several new countries, such as Algeria, where we had not been active previously or at least for a long time. We also participated in the activities of EUNIC, the network of cultural and scientific institutes of EU member states operating within the European Union. This, too, opens doors to new countries.

The Institute received significant recognition when the Student Union of the University of Helsinki (HYY) honoured it for producing research-based information on the current Israeli-Palestinian conflict. Director Susanne Dahlgren and researcher Antti Tarvainen accepted the award at the HYY’s anniversary celebration.

We are constantly developing our courses for Finnish students and students living in Finland – including in collaboration with our Nordic partners. Last year, we organized a student course in the United Arab Emirates. The course lectures were held in advance. The increasing authoritarianism in the Middle East and the narrowing of academic freedom require arrangements to challenge the lack of freedom of speech. At the same time, we have been able to involve an increasing number of researchers from the Middle East in our activities.

Despite the turbulent situation in the Middle East, the institute remains popular among students, who apply twice a year for an internship. Or perhaps it’s the opposite: an internship in the epicentre of global developments is a strong asset in a highly competitive job market. Last year, we celebrated the 50th birthday of our long-time administrative assistant, Manal Chatila, and created a large poster for her featuring photographs and greetings from those involved with FIME over the years. The institute has established itself as a prominent player in Lebanon’s vibrant academic life.

## Research

### Facilitating research activities in the Middle East

#### Law and Politics in Yemen

Susanne Dahlgren continued writing her two monographs, completed two peer-reviewed articles, and published the non-fiction volume *Muuttuva Lähi-itä maailmanjärjestyksen murtuessa* (The Changing Middle East in a Fragmenting World Order) together with Mikko Lohikoski (Atena, 2025, 551 pages). Dahlgren delivered presentations at, among others, the Arab Council for Social Sciences (ACSS) conference in Beirut and the conference of the Nordic Society for Middle Eastern Studies in Oslo and chaired two panels at the conference of the Middle East Studies Association (MESA) in Washington, DC. Dahlgren served as Chair of the Student Paper Prize Committee of the Association of Middle East Anthropology, a section of MESA, and continued as a member of the organisation's board.

#### Health Effects of Urbanisation in the Middle Bronze Age Levant (c. 2000–1500 BCE)

Osteoarchaeologist Nina Maaranen (PhD) launched her project *Urban health: Impact of urbanisation in the Middle Bronze Age Levant and beyond*, which examines an ancient burial site discovered in the city of Sidon/Saida in Lebanon. The project investigates how the health of the inhabitants of this trading centre changed during the Middle Bronze Age, when the site experienced significant growth in size, wealth, and external contacts.

#### Climate Change in Ancient Seals

Docent Joanna Töyräänvuori's research examines how climate change is reflected in the everyday lives of ancient people, particularly through the form and content of seals and seal impressions connected to personal identity. Töyräänvuori published the monograph *Historiaan hävinneet* (Lost to History) together with Kirsi Valkama and four peer-reviewed articles. In addition, she completed eleven peer-reviewed articles, six of which have been accepted for publication, and presented her research at scientific events as well as serving in positions of academic trust.

#### Research Residency Program

No residencies took place under FIME's researcher residency program in 2025.

#### Resident Scholar Program

Dr. Sana Tannoury-Karam served as FIME's local resident scholar from 1.9.2024 to 28.2.2025. She is Assistant Professor of History at the Lebanese American University (LAU). She is a scholar of the modern Middle East and global history, specialising in themes of the political left, internationalism and nationalism, the sociology of intellectuals, and the intellectual and social history of the Middle East. Her book project at FIME focuses on the political organisation and activism of a local intellectual group.

#### FIME Non-resident scholar Program

This new program strengthens the institute's networks both in the Middle East and beyond by affiliating researchers with the institute. The first affiliated scholar was Sana Tannoury-Karam (1.3.2025–28.2.2026). She will be followed by Dr. Adel Dashela (University of Turku, 1.3.2026–28.2.2027).

#### Scientific publications and presentations

Researchers of FIME and MIGDIA published 11 peer-reviewed articles, 2 edited volumes, 2 doctoral dissertations, 1 popular non-fiction book, and 7 shorter popular publications. In total, they delivered 16 academic presentations.

## Academic Collaboration

### Striving for international and free science in Finland and the Middle East

**Workshop: Spaces of Everyday Life, Spaces of Contestation: Urban Space as Lived and Fought for Beirut, 18.–19.11.**

The workshop brought together 17 researchers working on urban studies, social movements, everyday politics, and the modern history of the Middle East. Participants came from Egypt, Belgium, Lebanon, Pakistan, the United Kingdom, the United States, and Finland. The public keynote lecture of the workshop was delivered by Salwa Ismail (SOAS University of London), titled *The Making of the Revolutionary Neighbourhood (al-hayy al-tha'ir) in the 2011 Syrian Uprising*. The workshop was organised by Susanne Dahlgren in collaboration with The American University in Cairo (AUC).

**Workshop: The Middle East and the Making of Global Anti-Imperialism: Histories of the Twentieth Century**

*Beirut, 5.–6.12.*

This workshop, with 15 participants, examined the role of the Middle East in the history of global anti-imperialism. Participants came from Egypt, the United States, Germany, Sweden, India, the United Kingdom, Italy, and France. The public keynote lecture was delivered by Abdel Razzaq Takriti (Rice University), titled *From Nakba to Genocide: The Palestinian National Liberation Struggle and the Power and Limits of Global Anti-Imperialism*. The workshop was coordinated by Sana Tannoury-Karam and Susanne Dahlgren.

**Panel at a Conference: Between Resistance and Silence: The Houthi Administration and the Yemeni Civil War, How to Open the Knot**

*Beirut, 15.5.*

FIME organised a panel on the Yemeni civil war at the international conference of the Arab Council for Social Sciences (ACSS), titled *Devastation, Imaginaries and Knowledge: Regional Junctures and Global Repercussions*, held in Beirut on 15–18 May. The panel featured two Yemeni researchers invited from Finland, Yasmeen al-Eryani (University of Tampere) and Adel Dashela (University of Turku), as well as Susanne Dahlgren. The conference brought together hundreds of social scientists from across the Arab world, from Morocco to Bahrain.

## **Taking part in public discourse**

### **Providing research-based information on the Middle East that is increasingly needed in Finnish society**

FIME staff actively provide information to Finnish media and comment on developments in the Middle East. During the year, FIME or its staff appeared in the media 78 times. Media interest focused particularly on the war in Gaza and Iran, but there was also interest in the empires of the ancient Middle East.

## **Lähi-itä NYT Blog and Podcasts ([www.lahi-itanyt.fi](http://www.lahi-itanyt.fi))**

This multi-voiced platform operates between fast-paced news reporting and analytical academic research, offering broad and critical perspectives on the Middle East and developments in the region.

**FIME produced and published the video “How to Report on Israel–Palestine?”** and organised a video launch event for journalists on the topic on 3.12.

**Public events:** FIME, together with the Finnish Institute of International Affairs, organised the discussion event NATO and the Middle East at the Finnish Parliament Annex. In cooperation with the University of Helsinki, Finnish-Syrian Friendship Association, and Hakunila International Organisation, FIME organised the seminar The Future of Syria and the Diaspora. In collaboration with the University of Helsinki, FIME organised the panel discussion What’s Going on in Turkey: Peace with the PKK, Suppressing the Opposition? Together with the Finnish-Arab Business Association, FIME organised the event Regional Outlook and Foreseen Opportunities: Syria, Iraq, and Saudi Arabia. In addition, FIME organised two informal networking events in Beirut and two in Helsinki during the year.

**Non-fiction Book: *Muuttuva Lähi-itä maailmanjärjestyksen murtuessa*** the non-fiction book by FIMEs director Susanne Dahlgren and Middle East expert Mikko Lohikoski received significant visibility in Finland. Interviews with the authors attracted large audiences at the Helsinki Book Fair and at the book launch event held at Rosebud Books. The book has also been among the most reserved volumes in libraries.

**The Student Union of the University of Helsinki (HYY) awarded** FIME for its work in explaining the Israel–Palestine conflict by producing and disseminating research-based knowledge to the wider public. The award was presented at the HYY’s anniversary celebration in November.

## Foundation of the Finnish Institute in the Middle East

### The Foundation maintains the Institute

#### Foundation's Grants and Research

The Foundation of the Finnish Institute in the Middle East awarded a total of 26,501 euros in grants. From these grants 17,451 euros were used in 2025. A total of 2,000 euros were carried forward to be used in 2026, while the Aimo T. Nikolainen Grant, funded by the Konstantinus Association and awarded in 2024, was disbursed in 2025. Other grants utilised in 2025 included a two-month working grant for a Lebanese Resident Scholar, travel grants for two researchers for research visits to Syria and Lebanon, and grants for two advanced students of Arabic to cover course fees for Arabic language studies in Egypt.

#### Start-up Israel/Palestine: the political worlds of the innovation economy

Researcher Antti Tarvainen completed his doctoral degree at the University of Helsinki with the dissertation *Silicon Palestine: an inquiry into the entanglements of innovation and settler colonialism*. In addition, Tarvainen delivered two academic presentations related to his postdoctoral research at the annual conference of the Nordic Society for Middle Eastern Studies in Oslo.

## **Foundation's Anniversary Scholarships and SLIY's Pro Gradu Stipend**

In 2025, FIME awarded two scholarships, for which funding had been raised in connection with FIME's 30th anniversary celebrations held at the end of 2024. In addition, the *pro gradu* stipend of the Friends of the Finnish Institute in the Middle East was awarded through FIME.

#### International Migration and Diasporic Plurilingualism in Educational Paths

The MIGDIA research project, led by the institute's former director, Docent Irina Piippo, deals with migration, cross-border educational paths, and diasporic multilingualism. FIME will be the background organization for the research project funded by the Kone Foundation until 2027. The project involves five researchers from the fields of applied linguistics, anthropology, and world politics. Project researcher Dr. Sandra Nasser El-Dine defended her dissertation on April 25, 2025.
